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Preface

It is my great pride and pleasure to submit the Re-Accreditation Report (RAR) of our college to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore for assessment and accreditation of the college.

Dr. Gopalrao Khedkar Mahavidyalaya, Gadegoan (Telhara) is run by Shri. Shivaji Education Society, Amravati (M.S). Dr. Panjabrao alias Bhausaheb Deshmukh founded this society in 1932 with a great diligence. He is one of the greatest educationists, agriculturalists and reformists who started his social work through Shri. Shivaji Maratha High School to educate and upbring the poor rural students who were far away from the field of education. At present, Shri. Shivaji Education Society is the biggest society in the central India, running colleges, Trainning Centers, Schools and Kindergartens. In the year 1993-94, the society was awarded the Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Dalit Mitra Award and in the year 1990-2000, Sant Gadge Maharaj Memorial Award for its distinguished work and devotion in the field of education.

Dr. Gopalrao Khedkar Mahavidyalaya, Gadegoan (Telhara) came into being in 1969 with its specific goals and objectives. Residents of Telhara and villagers donated labours, finance and valuable times for the establishment of the institution. Initially, the college was known as Shri. Shivaji Arts and Commerce College. Keeping in mind the remarkable social work of late Honorable Dr.Gopalrao Khedkar, then the Rural Development Minister, Govt. of Maharastra, the college was re-named as Dr. Gopalrao Khedkar Mahavidyalaya, Gadegoan (Telhara) as a respect to his social work. Dharmal Sansthan of Gadegoan gave its land on leize to Shri. Shivaji Education Society Amravati. Since then Gadegoan was included with the name of the college. Today, the college offers Arts, Commerce and Science faculties and Post graduation in M. Com and M.A in Marathi and Political Science along with Career Oriented Courses.

The college is entirely located in the rural and remote areas. Learners who seek admission, belong to farmers' family to whom the college has been providing higher education since 1969. The college underwent NAAC in 2004 with C++. This is our second attempt applied for Cycle 2.We have prepared this Re-accreditation Report with our sincere and honest efforts and introspection. We did utmost efforts to prepare it exactly in accordance with the guidelines and formats provided by NAAC.We have exhibited our strength and weaknesses in this Re-accreditation Report honestly and sincerely. We have also provided an opportunity to the Peer Team for their evaluation so that we can build up our institution as a College with Potential for Excellence (CPE).

Executive Summary

(The SWOC analysis of the institution)

Criterion No I : Curricular Aspects

- The institution clearly states its vision, mission and the objectives and strives to fulfil them through various programmes and activities conducted in the institution. The academic work is strictly followed as per the Action Plans prepared at the beginning of the session and the review of the same is taken at the end of the session. The work that remains unfulfilled is stated clearly in the next year Action Plan.
- The syllabus prescribed by the university is completed before the commencement of the terminal examination. The modern electronic means such as computer lab, ICT room, LCD Projector, power point presentation and audio-visual aids are prominently used to make teaching learning more effective.
- The institution regularly interacts with the UGC, university and neighbouring industries to get benefits of knowledge and funds for the development of the institutions. Prof. R.V.Deshmukh, HOD, Department of Commerce, hasbeenamember on the Board of Studiesat the affiliating university.
- The college organizes class room seminars, workshops, group-discussion, cultural activities and extra curricular activities for overall development of students.
- Remedial coaching classes are arranged to provide extra coaching to the SC/ST/Minorities students who lag behind in studies.
- The institution has vocational and certificate courses such as Development of Communication Skill in English, Tax Planning and Management, E-Commerce etc. for the welfare of the students.
- Academic flexibility is available but the choice based credit system is not implemented.
- The NCC and the NSS units function to provide opportunities for students for their overall development. There is a distance learning centre of YCMOU, Nashik to provide educational opportunity for the general masses in the area. The institution arranges Career Enrichment Programmes to guide the young graduates who aspire for M.Com, M.B.A. etc. The institution has taken initiatives to start MPSC/ UPSC/Banking Coaching Classes. At the beginning of the academic session, under the chairmanship of the Principal, various committees are formed to conduct enrichment programmes.
- The college has a feedback mechanism for taking feedback from students and parents and other stakeholders.
- We have strong points 1.1.4, 1.1.6, 1.2.4, 1.4.3 and weak point 1.2.2, 1.2.3,1.1.

Criterion No II : Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

- The institution publishes information regarding admission process in the prospectus and also displayed it on the notice board. All admissions are taken place as per the government rules and University norms.
- In order to fulfill the goals and objectives to provide higher education to all section of society, the institution gives admission as "First come first serve". Atleast 35% of marks are required for taking admission to all the streams. It is analogous to other colleges situated in the area.
- The college forms admission committees for Arts, Commerce and Science faculties and the whole process is executed accordingly. The reservation quota for SC/ST/NT/OBC/Minority/Handicapped is strictly followed as per government rules and it is clearly mentioned in the college prospectus.
- The enrollment of the students during the last four years is satisfactory and it is increasing day by day. The liable students learn with other students equally and do not feel inferiority complex. The admission committees counsel students regarding the choice of the optional subjects.
- The institution provides co-education. The sexual harassment committee is established to resolve the disputes, if any, but no incident as such occurred in the college premises yet. The environmental tour is organized to increase students' awareness for the environment.
- The topper students are provided extra books from the library and also motivated to participate in open debates, elocution competition, debates, seminars, group discussion etc. Besides, Competitive examination classes are held for the pre-preparation of UPSC/MPSC. The dropout rate of the college during the year 2012-13 is 29.06% and efforts are being made to reduce it.
- The college held four units tests and terminal examination to evaluate the
 academic performance of the students. The students are motivated to
 participate in innovative programmes for overall development of personality.
 The college has Academic Planning Committee which prepares Academic
 Calendar. The teachers make provisions for annual plan and daily academic
 diary.
- The IQAC was established in the institution on 5th December 2004. It prepares the Annual Action Plan in the beginning of the academic session. The plan is implemented throughout the year. An utmost care has been taken to make the education students-centric. Therefore, the lectures of the resource persons are prominently organized for the welfare of the students.

- The modern electronic means of imparting education are made available in the college such as virtual laboratory, computer lab, internet, LCD Projector etc. The teachers are aware of the recent trends in research and actively present research papers in various state, national and international seminars and conferences. The teachers also use power point presentation to make teaching learning process more effective.
- The college has well equipped central library and departmental libraries as well. Every teacher tries to complete the prescribed syllabus as per the Academic calendar. The quality of education is evaluated through terminal examination, projects, practical, home assignments, viva voice examination and unit tests.
- At present the total number of regular teachers is 11. Out of which 04 are Ph.D holders, 03 M.Phil and 04 post graduate. There are also 16 teachers working on Clock Hour Basis. The college has started B.Sc, M.Com, M.A. (Marathi & Political Science) during the last three years. The students' response to these programmes is positive. There is 100% involvement of the teachers in staff development programme. Three teachers have completed and submitted MRP to the UGC and two teachers' MRP is going on.
- The college has feedback Committee for evaluation of the teachers. The Principal submits the confidential report of the teachers to the society for evaluation. The annual assessment and evaluation of the teachers is made through API (Academic Performance Indicator) and PBSA (Performance Based Self Appraisal System).
- The Grievances Cell is established and it functions to settle the dispute, if any. There is suggestion box as well. These complaints are readily attended to and solved instantly. The photographs of the merit students and those who are excellent in sports published in the college magazine. Teacher Sponsored Awards are provided to merit students to motivate them towards studies.
- We have strong points 2.2.4, 2.3.1, 2.3.3,2.3.5, 2.3.9, 2.3.11,2.4.4,2.4.6 and weak points 2.2.6, 2.4.3, (b) 2.4.5

Criterion No III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

- The institution has formed a Research Committee of five members to perform research activities. All the teachers are well qualified. Four are Ph.D holders and two are engaged for the same. Prin. Dr. Santosh Tarale is Ph.D guide. Out of five, three have completed Minor Research Projects and two projects are ongoing. Research projects are regularly audited. The college provides study leave and infrastructural facilities to carry out research work. Compared to previous report of NAAC, the research work has been increased immencely due to the guidance and motivation by the Research Committee. The students of commerce faculty submit projects under the guidance of the teachers.
- The teachers attend Refresher Course and Orientation Programme and update knowledge and skill in regular interval. The college has well equipped central library that provides text books, reference books, magazines to carry out research work. The various departments celebrate the anniversaries of great persons and invite experts on the occasion. The resource persons are also invited to deliver a guest lecture to instill research aptitude among the students.
- The institution stimulates the research work by granting study leave for training classes, national and international seminars and conferences and for Faculty Development Programmes. Many of the teachers presented research papers in national and international journal, seminars and conferences. Some have edited books while some teachers' articles are published as a chapter in the book.
- The National Cadet Corps and National Service Scheme are active in the college which function to bring about social awareness among the students. Through these units, some extension services are undertaken.
- The institution organizes various workshops, seminars and conferences in collaboration with other nieghbouring institutions.
- We have strong points: 3.1.2, 3.1.5, 3.1.6, 3.2.6, 3.4.3, 3.6.1,3.6.2, 3.7.4, 3.7.5 and weak points –3.1.1, 3.2.2, 3.2.3, 3.2.4, 3.2.6, 3.3.3, 3.3.4, 3.4.2, 3.4.4, 3.5.1, 3.7.5.

Criterion No IV:Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution has Purchase Committee to make infrastructure and learning resources available in the college. The committee call tenders and affordable tender is passed to purchase various materials.

- Theinstitution has three two-storey buildings including class rooms and administrative office. Separate science, Home-Economics and Computer laboratories are well equipped. The college has ICT room, digital E-board, Botanical Garden, common reading room, girls common room and Auditorium hall with LCD Projector etc. A soak pit is prepared for water harvesting. There is a farm lake, water tank for cattles, safe drinking water coolers in the college. The college maintains spacious playground for games and sports. The college runs Internal Quality Assurance Cell, Grievance Readdressed Unit, Counseling and Career Guidance Centre, Placement Cell, Health Centre, MPSC/UPSC Guidance Centre.
- The institution prepares its Master Plan every year through which necessary material of convenience is purchased by the Purchase Committee. Women's Hostel is constructed in the college premises which will start soon. Dr. Mr & Mrs Bihade are appointed as the medical officers-in-charge to regularly medical check up of the students. The college also strives to provide necessary facility to the physically disabled students on demand.
- Library Advisory Committee is functioning effectively. There are various text books, reference books, magazines, journals and daily newspapers in sufficient number to cater to the needs of the students. There are computers with internet facilities in the library. The college has feedback committee which functions to take feedback form the students. There is a complaint and suggestion box as well. The total number of computers in the college is 44 including the office, various departments, library and the computer lab etc. The college organizes workshop on computer hardware course to motivate staff to use ICT resources.
- We have strong points 4.1, 4.1.1, 4.1.2, 4.1.2(b), 4.1.3, 4.1.4, 4.1.5, 4.1.7, 4.2, 4.2.1, 4.2.2, 4.2.3, 4.2.5, 4.2.6, 4.2.7, 4.2.9, 4.3.1, 4.3.2, 4.3.3, 4.3.4, 4.3.5, 4.3.6, and weak points 4.1.2(a), 4.1.6, 4.1.2,4.2.4,4.2.8,4.4,

Criterion No V: Students Support and Progression

- The institution is committed to provide serveces to the learners. During the last academic year, Government of India scholarship Rs. 21,90,013/- were disbursed among SC/ST/VJNT/SBC/OBC students.
- The Government of India scholarship forms are filled online & free of cost. The college gives admission to all the students by charging minimum fees. There is a Girls Common Room for girl students. The physically disabled students are provided every facility in the college. They are also given extra time in the university examination as per university and government rules.
- The institution provides facilities such as finance, medical, health insurance, transportation and accommodation to the students participating in various competitions held at the university, state, national and international levels.
- There is a first-aid-box available in the college. The college has appointed two medical officers for checking up the students regularly. The college has MPSC/ UPSC guidance centre which organizes coaching classes to appear in the competitive examinations.
- The institution publishes "Mrudgandha" a yearly college magazine, for publishing poems, articles, short stories written by the students.
- The college makes substantial efforts to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students. The college arranges industrial tours to visit neighboring MIDC, Oil industries and also visiting other industries in the locality.
- The institution provides sports material, uniform and track to the students. The students are motivated and guided to participate in state, national and university level sports competitions. The total number of students qualifying in NET/SET/SLET/MPSC/UPSC and other competitive examinations is 71.
- The institution has career guidance and placement cell. Some students of the college have been selected in the placement cell organized by other colleges.
- The institution has Grievance Redressed Cell as per the university guidelines. There is a complaint and suggestion box in the college. Ragging in the institution is strickly prohibited.
- The students progression to post graduation and in employment is 80%. Students participate in sports games, cultural and other extracurricular activities.

- The ex-students of the college and employees are the member of Alumni Association who give their suggestion in feedback reports to improve the performance and quality of the institution.
- The students council is constituted every year in a democratic way. The college forms various academic and administrative bodies for the welfare of the students.
- We have strong points-5.1.1,5.1.2,5.1.6.5.1.7,5.1.8,5.1.9,5.1.10,5.1.11,5.1.12,5.1.13,5.1.14 and weak points 5.1.5,5.2.1,5.2.4,

Criterion – VI : Governance, Leadership and Management

- The college is run by Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati. The Local Managing Committee functions under the chairmanship of the President of Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati to manage the college work very efficiently. The executive members of Shri Shivaji Education Society are the members of LMC. The college Principal is the secretary of LMC. Teaching and non teaching staff are representatives in LMC.
- Variouscommittees are formed at the college level to fulfill the objectives and develop the college. The internal organizational structure of the college is as follows:1) Parents Organization 2) Local Managing committee 3) Principal and Academic In-charge 4) HOD's 5) IQAC 6) Academic Committees. All important decisions are taken in the LMC meeting.
- As per the guidelines of UGC and Govt. of Maharashtra, the qualified candidates are appointed for a probation period of two years. After completing the probation period, the employees are confirmed and made permanent. These employees are sent for trainings time to time to update their knowledge and skills.
- This instituion is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. The college has a Grievance Readdressl Cell to forbid the sexual harassment of girls and women in the college premises.
- The college receives financial aid from the government and the grants from the UGC. The audit of the college is made by the internal and external agencies. Chartered Accountant Shri N.R. Pundkar and Associates, Akola and Local Managing Committee made the internal audit while the external audit is done by the senior auditor of Higher Education, Amravati. InternalQuality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been formed in the college. The short term and long term development plans are prepared in the IQAC meeting. The IQAC also prepares Internal Quality Assurance Report (IQAR) every year and it is sent to NAAC.
- The units tests of the students are taken on the completed portion of the prescribed syllabus. The annual university examination result is put before the Local Managing Committee and it is elaborately discussed on the improvement of the result.
- We have strong points 6.1.1,6.1.2,6.1.3,6.1.4,6.1.6,6.1.7,6.2.1,6.2.3,6.2.4,6.2.6,6.2.7,6.2.9,6.2.10, 6.2.11,6.3.1,6.3.1,6.3.2,6.3.3,6.3.4,6.3.5,6.4.1,6.4.2,6.5.1,6.5.3,6.5.6,6.5.7, and weak points 6.2.8, 6.5.4

- The institution has made a farm lake, tree plantation, water conservation campaign to increase vigilance for the environment.
- The instituion has taken initiatives for innovative practices such as competitive examination classes and the courses of E-commerce and Communication Skill to the students.
- The students learning in this institution belong to economically backward and rural area. Therefore, the college has charged minimum fees for taking admissions to all the streams
- The junior college teachers financially supported Ku. Samira Ali for taking DTEd education.
- The Botanical Garden is formed in the college premises to help science students to be familiar with various plants and herbs. The garden yard is planted in the college as well.
- The students are motivated to prepare wall posters, manuscripts, handicrafts etc. to give scope to their latent skills.
- The institution has made innovations organising breast feeding week, nutrition week and a workshop on premarital awakening to make girls students aware of nutrition science and important breast feeding etc.
- In this age of information technology, it is prerequisite to know the role of hardware in the computer. Therefore, the knowledge of hardware is given to the students by organizing the training of hardware.

9. Presentation of Best Practices

1. Teacher Sponsored Awards

• Goals and Objectives:-

The goals and objectives of this practice is intended to provide financial assistance to students and assist them in studies.

• The Context:-

The college is established in the rural and backward areas. A large proportionate amount of learners are the sons of native farmers and they belong to SC/ST/OBC/VJNT and Minorities. With the assistance of Government of India Scholarship (GOI), students are able to continue their higher education. Besides, the college several runs Students Welfare Schemes such as Placement Cell, Counseling and Guidance Cell, Teacher Parents Association, Competitive Examination Guidance Cell, Remedial Coaching etc., Teacher Sponsored Awards was newly introduced in the college 2009. The term 'Teacher Sponsored Awards' was first coined by Dr. A.L.Kulat, the Chairman of Board of Studies, SGBAU, Amravati. This award not only encourages learners financially but also boosts their morale and confidence level.

• The Practice:-

The college is deeply concerned over the upliftment of rural students in the competitive era. Accounting this in mind, a resolution was passed in the Staff

Council Meeting to start this venture. It was resolved that the best student was to be selected from every class who secured highest mark in respective subject or who ranked topper in the class. Every teacher named the award voluntarily. There were 12 senior teachers including the principal who declared awards along with a certain amount of Rs. 4000/- (Four Thousand only) For example, the principal declared the award to the topper who would come first in the college. Likewise all respective teachers declared awards the student who got highest mark in their subjects. The result is that every year around 15 students have been benefited. Every year while celebrating Dr. Panjabrao Bhausaheb Birth Anniversary in the college, Teacher Sponsored Awards are distributed by eminent scholars. This event motivated others to pursue their studies.

• Evidence of Success:-

Since the beginning of the event, more than 100 students have benefited to move towards the upliftment of their education career. A survey has been conducted in the college to know the students' opinion about this event, the students asserted their enthusiasm and experience in persuasion of studies. Some of the students expressed their view that they could both procure financial assistance and way to go ahead.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

There was no problems to generate financial resources in the college. The teachers are financially sound and are able to pay willingly. It is a kind of help providing to needy students.

2. Check Dam Construction

- Goal and Objective of the Practice:- The goal of the practice is to conserve water and to increase the underground water level of the borewell in the college premises.
- The Context: Keeping in view the scarcity of water in summer season in the ares and the requirement of water for daily purposes, for plantation and nourishment of garden, the college has taken initiative to project Check Dam Construction at the right corner of the college. The NSS volunteers and NCC cadets as well as the staff supported to build this farm dam. The college also made an iron fencing roud the lake. Due to the large quantity of water available in the farm dam considerably increased the water level of the bore well and nearby plants and trees look fresh and green. The college also made Botanical Garden near the dam for easy growth of plants and herbs in the garden.
- The Practice: The college examined the land and it was noticed that threr always stagnated water just like a pond in rainy season. Therefore, this land area was neglected and of no other use. The principal and LMC members resolved to make use of this right corner of the campus to dig a farm-dam with the help of students /volunteers. The borewell is just fifty feet away from the dam. The iron fencing round the dam protects the stray cattles from entering into the lake- it also prohibits students to sit at the corner of the lake. It is rare thing to have farm-lake in any other college of the area. Apart from this, the college has also practiced to rain-water harvesting. For this reason, six feet by three feet soak pit was constructed for conservation of rain water. It is also helpful to increase the water level of the borewell.
- **Dvidence of success:** The practice made immense impact on increasing the water level as never before. The greenery considerably increased due

- to the water available in the farm-lake. This practice is totally new and can be followed by other colleges in the area. We do not have scarcity of water now. The water of the bore well is sufficient for all purposes.
- Problems Encountered and Resources Required: No problem as such occurred in executing this practice. The financial provision is solely made by the college. No government or UGC aided for constructing this project. The NSS voluntees, staff and NCC cadets wholeheatedly contributed to build the Check Dam Construction.

10. Post-accreditation Initiatives

The college was assessed and accredited in 2004 with C++. In the first accreditation report, NAAC peer team recommended several suggestions for the improvement of the college. The college is going for reaccreditation this year. IQAC was established in 2004 and chalked out development plan annually. While preparing development plan, suggestions recommended by NAAC peer team were kept for discussion and consideration. During last five years, the college has embarked on quality based educational and development initiatives. In post-accreditation, almost suggestions have been executed.

Formerly, the college offered B.A. and B.Com degree courses only. Now we have B.Sc., M.Com and M.A. in Marathi and Political Science. We have also started three certificate courses: E-Commerce, Tax-planning and Management and Development of Communication Skill in English. We have also started optional subjects namely English Literature and Indian Music at B.A. level and B.Com in English medium. The college awaited three years and discontinued

these subjects due to less admissions and lack of students response. The college is motivated with specific goals and objectives to provide higher education to all sections of society. Students from all categories are admitted to the college. The strength of girl students is more than fifty percent. The feedback committee takes feedback regularly on curriculum, students performance and library activities.

Formerly, the college gave admissions to students to various courses on their past academic records. Now the admission committees assess studentsknowledge and skill through interaction with students and their parents. Formerly, lecture method and translation methods were adopted, now teachers follow interaction method, lecture methods classroom seminar, group discussion etc. there are three virtual classrooms providing ICT based teaching. Students are regularly evaluated through unit test, terminal examination, viva-voce, and assignments.

Formerly, no teacher was Ph.D. holders and no teacher was engaged in research work. Now there are four Ph.D. teachers and three teachers completed Minor Research Projects and two teachers are engaged in Minor Research Projects. NSS and NCC conducted various extension activities like community development health and hygienic awareness, social work, medical camp blood donation camp, environment awareness, pulse-polio programme etc. However, Department of Marathi and commerce conducted extension activities outside the campus. Under the Nature Club, the college garden in premises is regularly kept clean. There is a research culture committee that motivates faculty for research work.

During last five years, all departments organize National Level seminars and conferences and workshops in collaboration with the neighboring institution. More than 50 research papers and articles have been published in National and International conferences and journals.

The college ensured to provide infrastructure facilities and learning resources to students. With the increase of students strength, the college received various development grants from UGC and constructed classrooms, girls common room, reading room and women hostel. The college also developed administrative office, Principal's office, science laboratories, computer laboratories. The garden has been beautified in front of the main building and besides the administrative building. Check Dam Construction, Botanical Garden and Water Harvesting internal roads, toilet, canteen are developed as per the requirements.

The college is a small unit so infrastructure facilities are adjusted as per the requirement. Two or more departments have been accommodated together with departmental libraries. Science laboratories have been developed as per UGC norms. The college building is utilized for conducting university examination, HSSC Board examination Election, Medical Camp, cultural activities. The college has well equipped central library having more than 30 thousand books including text books, reference books, journals, magazines newspapers etc. the library advisory committee made provision for purchasing learning material. Last year, the main office was automated and library automation is planned to do. The college has spacious playground for cricket, kabaddi, volleyball, kho-kho. Instead, the students participate in various games and sports at university level. Every

department is interconnected with lan and internet facility. There is a computer laboratory with internet facility providing for students.

The college ensures students support and progression. During last five years, the college has been providing Govt. of India scholarship, freeship, teachers-sponsored awards to SC/ST/OBC/ NT and other students. The college formed Employment Guidance Bureau and students counseling cell to provide employment guidance and counseling to students. Around 71 students were appointed in government jobs. The Alumni was registered and its members are involved in decision making process of the college. Students develop their personality and skill participating in cultural activities, youth festivals and inter collegiate competitions. Ku. Apeksha Balkrishna Dalu won gold medal and awards in 2011 at the university level. The NCC cadets attended national integration camp, army attachment camp and state Republic Day parade. There is Grievance Redressal Cell to tackle any kind of harassment. Ragging is strictly prohibited.

The college has local managing committee (LMC) and other Internal committees for co-ordinating and monitoring. All the teachers participated in Refresher and Orientation courses to update their knowledge and skill. The financial audit of the college is regularly completed by external and internal Auditors.

Since its last accreditation, the college has immensely progressed in infrastructure, students progression and the quality of the teachers. Now we are

well prepared to face reaccredition before the NAAC peer team. Post accreditation initiatives will deploy the quality enhancement made in the college.


